# THROUGH A COLLECTION OF FORCES

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

#### EMERGENCY RESIDENTIAL SHELTER

Our sixty-bed temporary shelter provides individuals and families with safety, meals, and a variety of support services to help them navigate this deeply challenging moment in their lives. Each family works with a Housing Stabilization Case Manager to identify potential barriers and to create and implement a tailored plan for the residents to achieve permanent housing. The shelter provides a community room, computer lab, classroom, private outdoor courtyard, laundry facilities, indoor and outdoor play areas for children and teens, and living quarters where families can stay together. Since the beginning of the pandemic, our shelter has remained open 24/7, and we continue to maintain health protocols to keep clients, volunteers, and staff safe.

Served 115 individual adults and 27 families with 60 children.

#### EDUCATION & EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

While systemic causes for homelessness predominate, we provide ample education and employment services to help people increase their income and take advantage of opportunities for better employment and permanent housing. Some of the skills courses and trainings we offer include job coaching, resume building, financial literacy, computer skills, and GED preparation. Through our Lee Fifer Jr. Educational Scholarship Fund, current and former residents may apply for assistance to access a wide range of academic and job training programs. All these programs enable our clients to increase their resilience against the forces causing homelessness.



#### THROUGH A COLLECTION OF FORCES (CONTINUED)

#### RAPID RE-HOUSING

We move families and individuals as quickly as possible from homelessness to stable, independent, affordable housing. Our Housing Locator Team identifies permanent housing opportunities and advocates for our clients during the leasing process. We also ensure community clients receive rental subsidies that gradually decrease as their income increases. Housing Stabilization Case Managers continue working with residents after they transition from the shelter to help them address new challenges and to encourage their ongoing housing stability.


### CITY OF ALEXANDRIA WINTER SHELTER COLLABORATIVE

In collaboration with the City of Alexandria, we operate an overnight seasonal hypothermia shelter to prevent injury, illness, and death. The Winter Shelter operates daily from December through March, and as needed on cold nights in November and April. We offer support services to help connect clients to community assistance.

Served 187 clients.

#### DAVID'S PLACE

Alexandria's only day shelter is open six days a week, providing a safe facility to meet the basic needs of men and women who are chronically homeless. Guests have access to warm showers, snacks, laundry facilities, private lockers, phone and voicemail services, Wi-Fi, a mailing address, and referrals to additional services. We saw a 34% decrease in individuals using David's Place this year, in part due to the success of more Permanent Supportive Housing units being available for those experiencing chronic homelessness.





#### THROUGH A COLLECTION OF FORCES (CONTINUED)

#### MENTAL HEALTH CARE

Our full-time Therapeutic Services Director offers on-site evaluation and care for adults and children. Residents have access to in-house support and connections to long-term, community-based treatment which can continue after transitioning from the shelter. Our therapist also conducts training for staff on mental health and substance abuse issues.

Served 138 clients.

#### CARPENTER'S CLINIC

A weekly on-site medical clinic is staffed every Thursday evening by a volunteer doctor, physician's assistant, and nurses who provide routine medical exams, prescription medications, and referrals to community healthcare partners. Also, a psychiatrist joins the team and coordinates with Finnie Caldwell, our Therapeutic Services Director. By providing ongoing access to healthcare for uninsured shelter residents and uninsured community members experiencing homelessness, we help to stabilize diseases and improve the health conditions that can often contribute to a cycle of homelessness.

Served 51 individuals with 113 visits.

#### PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

We provide housing and support for individuals who have experienced homelessness for many years and have long-term barriers to achieving independent, stable housing. We began serving our first ten residents in November 2020 when we moved into our new facility. Recognizing the continued need, we have since expanded this program to include four additional scattered-site Permanent Supportive Housing units.

# A NUDGE

A SUCCESS STORY

#### "She Never Gave Up; We Never Gave Up."

For nearly twenty years, Robin struggled with chronic homelessness, mental illness, and a hesitation to trust the housing options presented to her by various people in Alexandria's homeless service community. While she remained unhoused, she became a familiar face to many of the staff at Carpenter's Shelter, including her future Housing Stabilization Case Manager, Wakeena Corbin, pictured to the left of Robin. When we moved our facilities temporarily to the vacant Macy's building while our new Henry Street location was being built, Robin remained a presence at the interim location as well. And when we re-opened on Henry Street, Robin was one of the first guests to greet us at the new David's Place day shelter entrance.

As temperatures began dropping in late 2021, Wakeena implored Robin to check in to the hypothermia shelter that Carpenter's Shelter operates in coordination with the City of Alexandria. Although she resisted at first, Robin eventually did check in to the Winter Shelter. During her time there, Robin regularly worked with Wakeena and Denise Ziegler, our Winter Shelter Coordinator, to complete her re-housing applications, which she attended to occasionally as she remained ambivalent about following through with the re-housing process. As the holidays approached, she confirmed her desire for permanent housing and began living in her own private apartment in January 2022.

Robin recently celebrated a full year of independent living in her new apartment. She maintains an active relationship with Carpenter's Shelter staff, who helped her set up an aquarium for fish when she moved in, which she continues to care for and enjoy. She decorates her apartment with a minimalist aesthetic that includes beautiful stone arrangements she designs using stones sourced from a local pond.

Everyone at Carpenter's Shelter is incredibly proud of Robin's ongoing success and excited to see how she continues to grow as an individual with a strong foundation of independent permanent housing.
