



SETTING THE SCENE

Programs & Services

Served nearly 700 adults and 169 children through all programs in 2023. Of these, there were 408 single individuals and 86 families.


Emergency Residential Shelter

Our 64-bed temporary shelter provides families with a safe, warm place to sleep, eat, and build up savings to move into their own apartments.

Each family works with a Housing Stabilization Case Manager to identify potential barriers, set realistic housing goals, and create and implement a tailored plan to achieve permanent housing. As of March 2023, Carpenter's Shelter transitioned into an emergency shelter to exclusively serve families, nearly doubling the number of families served. After the transition, individuals are still supported through a variety of our other programs and services.

The shelter provides a community room, computer lab, classroom, private outdoor courtyard, laundry facilities, indoor and outdoor play areas for children and teens, and living quarters where families can stay together. Our shelter is open 24 hours, seven days a week.

Served 238 people (134 adults and 104 children). The average length of stay for families was 95 days. While we were sheltering individuals, the length of stay averaged 86 days.



With the support of Carpenter's Shelter's dedicated staff and volunteers, the family embarked on a journey of transformation.

EDUCATION AND EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

While systemic causes for homelessness predominate, we provide ample education and employment services to help people increase their income and take advantage of opportunities for better employment and permanent housing. Some of the skills courses and training we offer include job coaching, resume building, financial literacy, computer skills, and GED preparation.

Through our Lee Fifer Jr. Educational Scholarship Fund, current and former residents may apply for assistance to access a wide range of academic and job training programs. All these programs enable our clients to find permanent housing and sustain themselves financially.

The Lee Fifer Jr. Educational Scholarship Fund invested nearly \$25,000 in the futures of 9 clients.





They were provided with access to education and employment services, helping them acquire the skills needed to secure stable jobs and regain their financial footing.



RAPID RE-HOUSING

We move families and individuals as quickly as possible from homelessness to stable, independent, affordable housing. Our Housing Locator team identifies permanent housing opportunities and advocates for our clients during the leasing process. The Housing Locator team helps clients get finances in order by saving money, budgeting, gathering financial documents, setting realistic housing goals based on the client's budget, and making sure that the client can secure a lease on their own merits. We also ensure community clients (graduates) receive short-term rental subsidies (for security deposit, application fees, etc.) that decrease as their incomes increase. Housing Stabilization Case Managers continue working with residents after they transition from the shelter to help them address new challenges and encourage their ongoing housing stability.

Served 345 people (221 adults and 124 children). Carpenter's Shelter provided over \$1 million in short term rental assistance subsidies through its Rapid Re-Housing program in 2023.





CITY OF ALEXANDRIA WINTER SHELTER

In collaboration with the City of Alexandria, we operate an overnight hypothermia shelter to prevent injury, illness, and death. The Winter Shelter is open daily from November 1 through April 15 from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. We offer support services to help connect clients to community assistance. The program has 50 beds and few restrictions for shelter to ensure there is a safe place for people to stay out of the inclement weather.

Served 278 people (262 adults and 16 children).

DAVID'S PLACE

Alexandria's only day shelter is open six days a week from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m., providing a safe facility to meet the basic needs of individuals who are chronically homeless. Guests have access to warm showers, snacks, laundry facilities, private lockers, phone and voicemail services, Wi-Fi, a mailing address, and referrals to additional services.

Served 88 people. 25 individuals moved to emergency shelter or permanent housing in 2023.



In the coming weeks and months, they found jobs they were passionate about, enrolled their children in school, and became active members of their community once more.



An on-site medical clinic provided them with much-needed healthcare services, ensuring that their physical well-being was cared for as they worked to rebuild their lives.

MENTAL HEALTH CARE

Our full-time Therapeutic Services Director offers on-site evaluation and care for adults and children who have diagnosed or undiagnosed mental health issues, substance abuse disorder, or are in acute distress. Residents have access to in-house support and connections to long-term, community-based treatment which can continue after transitioning from the shelter. Our Therapeutic Services Director also conducts training for staff on mental health and substance abuse issues.



CARPENTER'S CLINIC

A weekly on-site medical clinic is staffed every Thursday evening by a volunteer doctor, physician assistant, and nurses who provide routine medical exams, prescription medications, and referrals for shelter residents who are mostly uninsured. Also, a psychiatrist joins the team and coordinates with our Therapeutic Services Director. By providing ongoing access to healthcare for uninsured shelter residents and uninsured community graduates experiencing homelessness, we help to stabilize diseases and improve the health conditions that can contribute to a cycle of homelessness.

Our clinic volunteers held more than 156 appointments to meet the medical needs of 81 individuals.

PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

We provide housing and support for individuals who have experienced homelessness for many years and have long-term barriers to achieving independent, stable housing. Carpenter's Shelter operates ten units of permanent supportive housing at The Bloom—which opened in 2020 and is located above the emergency residential shelter. We support an additional four units in scattered site locations in the community.

Served 16 people.

Mental health care and counseling services offered them the support and guidance they desperately needed to heal from the trauma of their experiences.

SUPPORTING CHARACTERS

Volunteers

Over the past 35 years, Carpenter's Shelter has continued to evolve from a small, dedicated group of individuals to an entire community of more than 1,200 volunteers dedicated to embodying our SEED Values and mission every day.

Our volunteers generously give their time and many talents to support our families and individuals, providing a sense of safety through our programs, services, and resources.

Throughout the year, Carpenter's Shelter's Volunteers can be found:

- Preparing and serving 850 meals annually to our residents, 365 days a year
- Staffing our front desk for more than 6,500 hours
- Serving on our board of directors, committees, and special task forces
- Engaging over 100+ hours per year with our children in shelter through creative play, dog therapy, and other activities
- Hosting over 600 hours of lifeskills courses and job coaching

- Providing medical and mental health care at Carpenter's Clinic
- Leading and performing a variety of special projects and Impact service days
- Decorating the shelter for all major holidays
- Providing special services like haircuts, hair styling, massages, and facials
- Assisting with Carpenter's Shelter special events
- Giving thousands of in-kind donations

A SUCCESS STORY

In the midst of the pandemic, Nia* faced a world that seemed to crumble around her. Her journey began with the pain of incarceration, compounded by the loss of her mother, leaving her to emerge into a reality of isolation and uncertainty. She found a flicker of hope in her children and her boyfriend, spurring her to seek a fresh start in Arizona. However, this hope was short-lived as Nia's boyfriend faced his own incarceration and was sent back to Virginia. With resilience as her compass, she made the daunting decision to return to Virginia, confronting the harsh reality of homelessness and the news of her pregnancy with twins.

Her path then led her to Carpenter's Shelter, a place she initially feared would be another chapter of hardship. She was introduced to Lawrence and Wakeena, who would become much more than just staff at the shelter—they became her guiding stars. Contrary to her fears, the shelter was a newly built haven, offering not just a roof, but nutritious food and a genuine sense of comfort and safety through the long, sleepless nights. This support became the cornerstone of her transformation. After a year of perseverance, navigating the challenges of finding childcare, securing employment, and creating a savings plan, Nia triumphed.

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She moved into her own apartment with her boyfriend and four young infants and obtained custody of her two oldest boys—reuniting her family under one roof. Recently, her boyfriend received a Lee Fifer Jr. Educational scholarship that enabled him to obtain his Commercial Driver's License (CDL). Furthermore, Nia secured a job as a PRN nurse and has set her sights on becoming a certified nursing assistant. At Carpenter's Shelter, she found more than just a place to rest her head; she experienced humanity in its purest form. The staff became the embodiment of the support and care every individual deserves, regardless of their circumstances. Nia's experience stands as a powerful testament to the profound impact of compassion, underscoring her belief that "in times of despair, there are always hands willing to lift you up, hearts ready to empathize, and a community ready to embrace."

Cook-Off Pop-Up 2022

Guests indulged in an array of culinary delights, with 24 restaurants and caterers showcasing a sample of their finest dishes. The event was one for all ages. Children immersed themselves in creative endeavors, decorating chef hats and enjoying face painting in the Children's Corner, while the adults enthusiastically participated in the silent and live auctions. The day was further energized musically by the band, Jones Point.



Peter Lunt, community volunteer and Carpenter's Shelter ambassador, received the third Val Hawkins award. This award is given to an individual who has demonstrated sustained commitment to Carpenter's Shelter. Town Hall Meeting: Switch to All Families

Carpenter's Shelter hosted a pivotal Virtual Town Hall on Family Homelessness on February 4. This timely event was a response to the alarming trend of increasing family homelessness since the COVID pandemic began. The Shelter highlighted its strategic shift to address this crisis, primarily through the adaptation of its Emergency Residential Shelter to prioritize families with children. This change ensured that the most vulnerable families would have access to immediate and compassionate care.

The Shelter's dedication to combating homelessness was further strengthened by the support from the Bezos Day 1 Families Fund, a crucial partnership enabling the shelter to continue its mission over the next five years. The Town Hall meeting also served as a call to action, urging the community to contribute in various ways, by donations, volunteering, or advocacy, to make homelessness in Alexandria a rare, brief, and nonrecurring experience.

Residents' Juneteenth Celebration

Carpenter's Shelter took a significant step in addressing the pressing issue of homelessness within the Black community by proudly hosting a Juneteenth event for residents, community graduates, board members, volunteers, and staff. Juneteenth, a day commemorating the emancipation of enslaved African Americans, holds great importance as it symbolizes freedom and the ongoing struggle for equality. The event held by Carpenter's Shelter not only honored this historic day, but also highlighted the critical need to address and raise awareness about the systemic challenges that continue to affect the Black community, especially in the realm of homelessness.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Bezos Day 1 Fund

Carpenter's Shelter was one of the 40 organizations from 26 states and Puerto Rico that received the Bezos Day 1 Families Fund financial award. This award is given to organizations doing compassionate, needle-moving work to help families experiencing homelessness.
