HOME is Where the ART Is

You may have noticed beautiful artwork from <u>HOME is Where the ART Is</u> on the hallways of The Hoffman Center and Alexandria Community Shelter. The artwork brightens the space, and as residents transition to their own homes, they can choose artwork to take with them.

"We are truly grateful for the partnership with HOME is Where the ART Is!" said Jamie Ergas, Deputy Director at Carpenter's Shelter. "Having the art displayed in the shelter for the residents to see, knowing they can choose a piece when they move to their own homes, is a reminder that we all believe they can do it. It is not a matter of *if*, it is a matter of *when*. Nothing is more powerful than instilling hope."

Reilly Schilling and her father Brian are the team behind HOME is Where the ART Is. Reilly Schilling is currently a teenager attending high school at Arlington Tech. She is continuing the mission of HOME Is Where the ART Is after her family friend started the organization five years ago to brighten the spaces of shelter residents moving into permanent housing.

Many art pieces for HOME is Where the ART Is come from individual artists who are clearing out their studio, unsold paintings from art shows and the Arlington Artists Alliance.



Schilling is always looking for more art and is committed to finding a display space for every piece she collects. "If you donate art to HOME is Where the ART Is, chances are very good that it will get seen and that it will end up making someone very happy in the future, " said Schilling. "I think the most compelling reason for most artists [to donate pieces to our organization is] the idea that their art will get out into the world and do some good."
